

The Subtle Language of Assumptions: A Pragmatic Analysis of Implied Meanings in “She Walks in Beauty” with J.L. Austin’s Theoretical Lens

This study presents an in-depth analysis of the pragmatic presuppositions embedded in the poem “She Walks in Beauty.” Drawing upon the theory of presupposition developed by philosopher and linguist J. L. Austin, this study aims to uncover the implied meanings and assumptions that shape a poem’s communicative dynamics. The methodology employed in this study involves a meticulous examination of the shared knowledge, assumptions, and cultural references within the poem. Through close reading and textual analysis, the researchers identified instances of pragmatic presuppositions and analyzed their effects on the poem’s overall meaning. Additionally, this study applies a pragmatic framework to understand how these presuppositions contribute to the interpretation and reception of “She Walks in Beauty.” The outcome of this research reveals the subtle nuances and hidden implications within the poem, shedding light on the poet’s intentions and enriching our understanding of its intricate layers. This study, ultimately underscores the critical significance of pragmatic presuppositions in the realm of poetic discourse, offering enriched perspectives on “She Walks in Beauty” and yielding valuable implications for the enhancement of literary education and language pedagogy, thereby broadening our grasp of linguistic functionalities in poetry and augmenting cultural awareness.

INTRODUCTION

“She Walks in Beauty” is a renowned poem written by Lord Byron, also known as George Gordon Byron, an influential figure in English Romantic poetry. First published in 1814, the poem has since captivated readers with its lyrical beauty and profound exploration of aesthetics, love, and the interplay between darkness and light. It’s enduring popularity and literary merits make it an intriguing subject of in-depth analysis.

The poem is a concise and exquisite expression of admiration for women’s beauty. It consists of three stanzas, each composed of six lines, and it follows the ABABAB rhyme scheme. Lord Byron’s meticulous choice of words and vivid imagery evokes a sense of awe and enchantment as he describes the harmonious blend of physical and spiritual beauty in the woman he portrays.

The significance of “She Walks in Beauty” lies not only in its aesthetic appeal but also in its ability to convey deeper meanings and evoke profound emotions. The poem goes beyond a mere description of physical attractiveness, delving into the realms of morality, virtue, and the complexities of human nature. It invites readers to contemplate the interplay between light and darkness, suggesting that true beauty is not merely superficial but encompasses both external and internal qualities.

“She Walks in Beauty” by Lord Byron is a timeless poem that explores the concept of beauty and its enduring significance. It serves as a contemplation of the divine and carries relevance that distinguishes it from the present day. The poem’s ability to transcend time highlights the lasting impact of poetry and its ability to remain relevant across the generations.

The present study “The Subtle Language of Assumptions: A Pragmatic Analysis of Implied Meanings in ‘She Walks in Beauty’ with J.L. Austin’s Theoretical Lens,” aims to delve into implied meanings within the poem through the lens of Austin’s theoretical framework. This pragmatic analysis seeks to uncover the subtle language of the assumptions present in the poem, shedding light on the deeper layers of significance that contribute to its aesthetic and emotional impacts.

One aspect that distinguishes “She Walks in Beauty” is the ability to resonate with contemporary poetry. Although many poems may fade into obscurity over time, this composition remains relevant. This serves as an illustration of the timeless nature of poetry, wherein the beauty and meaning of a poem can be applied to the present moment. The poem’s capacity to evoke emotions and capture the essence of beauty ensures its continued appreciation and relevance in today’s world.

Beauty, as depicted in the poem, remains constant over time, even as beauty standards evolve. Lord Byron effectively conveys the multifaceted nature of beauty through the contrast between darkness and light. The interplay between these elements represents the concealed and intrinsic aspects of beauty (darkness) as well as the external and readily apparent beauty (light). By exploring this duality, the poem emphasizes that true beauty lies in the balance between these contrasting elements.

Furthermore, the poem highlights the subjectivity of beauty, as its meaning and interpretation vary from individual to individual. Beauty is not a singular concept but rather flexible and open to different perspectives. Lord Byron’s portrayal of beauty through the balance of darkness and light demonstrates that perfection is achieved when these elements harmonize. True beauty is revealed through this ideal balance.

Significance of the study

This research employs J.L. Austin’s theoretical lens to conduct a pragmatic analysis of “She Walks in Beauty.” Austin’s pioneering work laid the groundwork for the “Speech Acts Theory,” which has introduced pragmatic considerations to philosophy. By examining the implied meanings and assumptions within the poem, this study aims to uncover the subtle language at play and explore how these assumptions shape the interpretation and reception of the poem. This analysis contributes to a deeper understanding of the interplay between language, assumptions, and meaning in poetic communication, enriching our interpretation and appreciation of the implied meaning of the poem.

In 2017, Abdul Razzaq Darweesh analyzed William Wordsworth’s “The Solitary Reaper” and Lord Byron’s “She Walks in Beauty,” specifically focusing on the significance of the image of “woman” in both poems. This research aimed to interpret each poem separately using imagery as a literary and rhetorical device. A comparative analysis was conducted to highlight the central image of “woman” and the minor images used to emphasize the importance of “woman” in both poems.

In 2019, Suryandari et al. conducted a study on the discourse on beauty during the Romanticist era, specifically examining the works of Lord Byron. This study provides valuable insights into the concept of beauty during the Romanticist era, highlighting the connection between physical, intellectual, and natural beauty, as well as the critical role beauty played in shaping the cultural and social discourse of the time.

In her argument, Stina Backstrom (2020) challenges the validity of Austin’s distinction between illocution and perlocution, asserting that it necessitates an additional philosophical investigation and a critical examination of underlying assumptions. Backstrom proposed an alternative conception of telling, contending that it holds no inherent superiority or inferiority compared to the conceptions rooted in the illocutionary/perlocutionary distinction. Furthermore, she draws attention to the philosophical dialectic underlying the distinction, which is reminiscent of discussions in the philosophy of perception. This parallel strengthens the argument that the illocutionary/perlocutionary distinction carries problematic assumptions and

warrants a re-evaluation of its conceptual framework.

In 2021, Septi Mulyaningsih analyzed Lord Byron's poem, focusing on the types of figures of speech used and their meaning in describing a woman. This study aimed to identify and examine the figures of speech employed by Byron, including simile, personification, metaphor, alliteration, synecdoche, and hyperbole. These literary devices were found to enhance the beauty of the poem and create vivid illustrations for readers, allowing them to imagine the beauty of women more vividly.

In 2022, Gurpreet Kaur et al. examined the application of English poetry as a subject in costume design, focusing specifically on romanticism of life and beauty. A comprehensive analysis was conducted to determine whether the literary works of William Wordsworth, John Keats, P.B. Shelley, and Lord Byron could inspire novel approaches to costume design. and investigated the visual representation of these thematic elements, focusing specifically on the connection between wearable art, aesthetics, and literature.

In 2022, Philip Mills supported the elimination of poetry and other 'parasitic words' from his evaluation. Cavell's reinterpretation of perlocutions as 'passionate utterances' offers a more efficient theoretical framework for analyzing poetic events. Examining Austin from a Cavellian perspective provides insights into the parasitic functions that Austin dismissed and integrates poetry into the philosophy of language.

Research Gap

Despite the existing studies on Lord Byron's poem "She Walks in Beauty," there remains a research gap regarding the pragmatic analysis of implied meanings within the poem using J.L. Austin's theoretical lens. None of these studies specifically explored the subtle language of assumptions and implied meanings within the poem. To address this research gap, a pragmatic analysis is necessary to unravel the underlying layers of meaning and assumptions conveyed in "She Walks in Beauty" by applying J.L. Austin's theoretical lens.

This analysis explores how a poem's language and structure subtly imply certain meanings and assumptions that may not be explicitly stated. Utilizing Austin's theories of speech acts, including locutionary, illocutionary, and perlocutionary acts, as well as the concept of performative language, this study seeks to provide a more profound understanding of the poem's implied meanings and to shed light on the intricate nuances inherent in the text.

Research Problem

The research problem identified is the lack of a pragmatic analysis that utilizes Austin's theoretical lens to examine the implied meanings and assumptions conveyed in Lord Byron's poem, "She Walks in Beauty." There is a research gap pertaining to the investigation of how a poem's language and structure communicate subtly certain meanings and assumptions that are not explicitly stated.

Main Research Question

The main research question for this study, "The Subtle Language of Assumptions: A Pragmatic Analysis of Implied Meanings in 'She Walks in Beauty' with J.L. Austin's Theoretical Lens," was:

How do the pragmatic presuppositions, as analyzed through J.L. Austin's theoretical lens, contribute to the implied meanings and overall communication dynamics in Lord Byron's poem "She Walks in Beauty"?

Sub Questions

The following research questions are interlinked with the main research question. Each sub-question addresses different aspects of the main research question and contributes to a comprehensive analysis of the poem's pragmatic presuppositions and communicative dynamics.

1. How can Austin's theory of presupposition be applied to conduct a pragmatic analysis of Lord Byron's poem "She Walks in Beauty" to uncover the implied meanings and assumptions embedded in the poem's communicative dynamics?
2. What are the shared knowledge, assumptions, and cultural references within "She Walks in Beauty" that contribute to the formation of pragmatic presuppositions, and how do these presuppositions shape the overall meaning of the poem?
3. Through close reading and textual analysis, what instances of pragmatic presuppositions can be identified in "She Walks in Beauty" and how do they affect the interpretation and reception of the poem?
4. How does the application of a pragmatic framework enhance our understanding of the poet's intentions and the intricate layers of meaning in "She Walks in Beauty"?
5. What practical applications can be derived from the study of pragmatic presuppositions in poetic communication and how can the findings contribute to literary and language teaching, promote cultural awareness, and enhance the understanding of language functions in poetry?

All of these research questions address the need to fill the research gap by conducting a pragmatic analysis of "She Walks in Beauty" using Austin's theory of presupposition. These questions explored the implied meanings and assumptions in the poem, the influence of shared knowledge and cultural references on pragmatic presuppositions, and the impact of these presuppositions on interpretation and reception. Furthermore, the research questions investigated how the application of a pragmatic framework enhances the understanding of the poet's intentions and intricate layers of meaning.

Finally, the research questions consider the practical implications of studying pragmatic presuppositions in poetry, including their relevance to literary and language teaching, cultural awareness, and understanding of language functions in poetic communication. The research questions were aligned to the research methods used in this study.

Rationale for the Theoretical Framework

Austin's theoretical lens, known as speech act theory, provides a framework for analyzing language beyond its literal meaning and explores the performative aspects of communication. Austin's theory suggests that utterances not only convey information but also perform actions and have social implications. This lens is especially relevant in literary analysis, as it allows researchers to delve into the implied meanings, intentions, and effects of the language used in literary works.

According to Austin, there are three main types of speech act: locutionary, illocutionary, and perlocutionary. The locutionary act refers to the basic act of uttering words and conveying their literal meaning. The illocutionary act extends beyond its literal meaning and focuses on the intended force or effect of the speech act, such as making a request, giving an order, or expressing an opinion. The perlocutionary act considers the impact or response of a speech act on the listener or audience.

Applying Austin's theoretical lens involves examining how the language and structure of a literary work implies certain meanings, assumptions, and intentions that may not be explicitly stated. It involves investigating the illocutionary force behind the author's choice of words, exploring the performative nature of language in creating specific effects on the reader, and analyzing the perlocutionary impact of the text on the audience's understanding and interpretation.

The uniqueness of this study lies in its innovative methodology, which combines pragmatic analysis and an exploration of implied meanings in "She Walks in Beauty". Additionally, it stands out for its critical examination of the assumptions underlying Austin's distinction and investigation of parallel and philosophical dialectics. These aspects collectively contribute to a fresh and distinctive approach to understanding the linguistic elements and pragmatic assumptions of the poem.

Research Method

To address the research question, this study employed a qualitative research design to analyze Byron the poem “She Walks in Beauty.” According to Denzin and Lincoln (2018, p. 3), qualitative research involves interpretive and naturalistic approaches that enable a natural understanding of phenomena. This method allows for an in-depth exploration of the implied meanings and assumptions within the poem “She Walks in Beauty” and the pragmatic presuppositions embedded in its communicative dynamics. By closely examining the language, structure, and poetic devices used in the poem, researchers can uncover the subtle nuances and hidden implications that contribute to understanding the poet’s intentions and the intricate layers of meaning.

Data Collection

This study gathered rich and nuanced insights into the poem “She Walks in Beauty” and its pragmatic presuppositions. A qualitative research design was chosen for the study, allowing for an interpretive and naturalistic exploration of the poem’s implied meanings and assumptions. In this research, Lord Byron’s poem “She Walks in Beauty” serves as the primary corpus for analysis. Researchers closely examined the poem’s language, structure, and poetic devices to uncover its hidden implications and nuances. By conducting textual analysis, they aimed to identify pragmatic presuppositions and explore how these assumptions contribute to the overall meaning of the poem. To provide a broader perspective, the researchers reviewed relevant documents and literary criticism, which offered insights into Lord Byron’s intentions, the historical context surrounding the poem, and its critical reception.

Analysis

Using these rigorous methodologies and data collection procedures, this study sought to achieve a comprehensive understanding of “She Walks in Beauty” and its implications. It emphasizes a careful analysis of the poem’s language and meaning while recognizing the inherent subjectivity in the interpretation process.

First Stanza

*She walks in beauty, like the night
Of cloudless climes and starry skies;
And all that’s best of dark and bright
Meet in her aspect and her eyes;
Thus mellowed to that tender light
Which heaven to gaudy day denies.*

“*She walks in beauty, like the night*”: The underlined phrase presupposes the existence of a woman who possesses beauty. This assumes that the audience is aware of women’s physical movements and appearance. The comparison to night implies qualities of elegance, mystery, and tranquillity associated with night.

“*Of cloudless climes and starry skies;*”: This phrase presupposes the existence of cloudless and starry environments. This assumption assumes that the audience is familiar with these atmospheric conditions and can appreciate the clear and dazzling qualities described..

“*And all that’s best of dark and bright,*”: This line presumes the existence of contrasting elements of darkness and brightness. This assumption assumes that the audience understands these opposing qualities and their potential combinations. This suggests that the woman embodies the best qualities of both darkness and brightness, creating a harmonious and captivating beauty.

“*Meet in her aspect and her eyes,*”: The phrase supposes the presence of the woman’s facial expression and eyes. It is assumed that an audience can observe these features. This suggests that a woman’s beauty is not solely physical, but also reflects her inner qualities, as the contrasting elements converge in her appearance.

“*Thus mellowed to that tender light,*”: In this line, the word “mellowed” presupposes a prior state of intensity

or brightness. It is assumed that the audience understands the transition. The phrase suggests that a woman's beauty is softened or refined to a tender light, indicating a gentle and soothing quality.

“Which heaven to gaudy day denies.”: This phrase presupposes the existence of an alternative to the gaudiness of daylight: it is assumed that the audience can envision this contrast. This suggests that women's beauty resembles the celestial beauty of heaven, which is denied to the garishness of the daytime.

Discussion: This analysis of the first stanza demonstrates Austin's theory of presupposition. The language and imagery used in the poem create implicit meanings and assumptions about women's beauty, highlighting their elegance, balance, and subtlety. The poet's choice of words and metaphors invites readers to interpret and engage with implied meanings, thereby revealing the intricate layers of beauty described in the poem. The poet presupposes the existence of certain elements, assumes the audience's familiarity with various concepts, and uses language and metaphors to convey women's beauty and contrast to the overwhelming brightness of the day.

Second Stanza

*One shade the more, one ray the less,
Had half impaired the nameless grace
Which waves in every raven tress,
Or softly lightens o'er her face;
Where thoughts serenely sweet express,
How pure, how dear their dwelling-place.*

“One shade the more, one ray the less,” : This statement suggests that any little alteration in the equilibrium between light and darkness would reduce a woman's attractiveness. It is assumed that there is a fragile balance between the light and dark conditions. Utilizing poetic methods such as parallel organization and numerical imagery produces a rhythmic and balanced impact.

“Had half impaired the nameless grace.” : This expression presupposes the existence of a grace that can be potentially diminished. This finding suggests that women's beauty is nameless and indescribable. The use of the past tense "had" implies a hypothetical scenario. The word "impaired" implies a decrease in quality or perfection.

“Which waves in every raven tress,” : The word “waves” implies a flowing and undulating movement, suggesting that the grace mentioned earlier is embodied in the woman's flowing black hair. This metaphorical use of language adds depth and imagery to the descriptions of beauty.

“Or softly lightens o'er her face;” : The word “lightens” suggests a gentle illumination that delicately enhances the beauty of the woman's face. This conveys a subtle sense of radiance and brightness. The use of the adverb "softly" emphasizes the gentle and understated nature of this light.

“Where thoughts serenely sweet express,”: This line presupposes the existence of the woman's thoughts and their ability to be expressed through her countenance. This suggests that her facial expressions reflected serene and sweet thoughts. The use of alliteration with the repeated “s” sound adds musical and soothing qualities to the line.

“How pure, how dear their dwelling-place.” : This line of thought presupposes the existence of a place of residence for women. It is assumed that her thoughts have the place or realm in which they reside. The adjectives “pure” and “dear” convey a sense of sanctity and preciousness associated with this dwelling-place.

Discussion : In this excerpt, Austin's theoretical lens helps us analyze the presuppositions and speech acts

present in the lines. The poet presupposes certain aspects such as the delicate balance between light and darkness, the existence of grace and thoughts, and the presence of a dwelling place for these thoughts. The use of poetic devices such as metaphors, alliteration, and parallel structures enhances the imagery and emotional impact of the lines, adding depth and beauty to the description of the woman's allure.

Third Stanza

*And on that cheek, and o'er that brow,
So soft, so calm, yet eloquent,
The smiles that win, the tints that glow,
But tell of days in goodness spent,
A mind at peace with all below,
A heart whose love is innocent!*

"And on that cheek, and o'er that brow," : This phrase presupposes the existence and visibility of the woman's facial features. It is assumed that the audience is aware of these specific areas on their face. The use of the prepositions "on" and "o'er" emphasizes the physical location of these features.

"So soft, so calm, yet eloquent," : The adjectives "soft" and "calm" presuppose certain qualities about the woman's appearance and demeanor. They assumed that the audience understands and perceives these attributes. The word "eloquent" suggests that her expression communicates effectively or speaks in volume.

"The smiles that win, the tints that glow," : This phrase presupposes the presence of smiles and colorful hues. It is assumed that the audience can observe and appreciate these facial expressions and colors. The use of the verbs "win" and "glow" implies the positive impact and radiance they possess.

"But tell of days in goodness spent," : This line presupposes that the smiles and tints reveal information about the woman's past experiences. It is assumed that the audience can interpret these expressions as indications of the days lived in virtue and goodness. The use of the verb "tell" suggests that her appearance conveys a narrative or story.

"A mind at peace with all below," : This phrase presupposes the existence of the woman's mental state. This assumes that her mind is in a state of tranquility and harmony with the world. The use of the preposition "with" implies a sense of unity and acceptance.

"A heart whose love is innocent!" : This phrase presupposes the existence of a woman's emotional state and love. It assumes that her heart is pure and untainted, emphasizing her sincerity and lack of malice in matters of love. The use of exclamation marks adds both emphasis and intensity to this statement.

Discussion: J.L. Austin's theoretical framework helps to analyze the fundamental assumptions and communication activities seen in the lines. The poet assumes that the woman's facial features are obvious, showing gentleness, calmness, and expressiveness through smiles and vibrant colors. The poem implies the disclosure of her previous encounters, inner virtue, tranquil mental condition, and purity of her heart's affection. Employing literary techniques such as vivid descriptions, contrast, and exclamation enhances imagery, emotional impact, and emphasis on lines, depicting the woman's inner and outer beauty.

Nuanced Layers of Meaning

Speech Acts: The poem employs descriptive language and metaphorical comparisons to convey women's beauty. It uses speech acts to evoke emotions, create vivid imagery, and engage the audience's imagination.

Example line: *"She walks in beauty, like the night."*

Implication: The line presupposes the existence of a woman and assumes that the audience is aware of her physical movement. This implies that her walking style has a certain quality of beauty, similar to the night. The speech act comparing her to night evokes a sense of elegance, mystery, and serenity, inviting the audience to envision her captivating presence.

Presuppositions: This poem presupposes the existence of a cloudless and starry environment. It is assumed that audiences are familiar with these atmospheric conditions.

Example line: “Of cloudless climes and starry skies.”

Implication: This line of thought presupposes the existence of cloudless and starry environments, assuming that audiences can imagine them. The speech act of describing the woman in connection with these natural elements suggests beauty that reflects clarity, brilliance, and celestial allure. This engages the audience's imagination and evokes a sense of wonder and admiration.

Presuppositions: The poem presupposes the presence of women’s facial expressions and eyes. It is assumed that an audience can observe these features.

Example line: “Meet in her aspect and her eyes.”

Implication: This line of thought presupposes the existence of women’s facial aspects and eyes. It is assumed that the audience perceives these physical attributes. The speech act describing her aspect and eyes suggests that her beauty is not merely superficial, but also emanates from her inner qualities. This implies a convergence of contrasting elements in her appearance, captivating the audience with her allure.

By applying Austin’s theoretical lens to Lord Byron’s poem, this study uncovered the implications of speech acts that enhance our understanding of women’s beauty. The poem presupposes certain elements, assumes the audience’s familiarity with concepts, and uses language to evoke emotions and create vivid images. Through these implications and speech acts, the poem invites the audience to appreciate the woman’s captivating presence and beauty that she embodies.

Focusing on Speech Acts

“She walks in beauty, like the night” : The speech act here is a simile, comparing the woman’s walking to the night. This comparison evokes a sense of grace, elegance and mystery. It engages in the audience's imagination and paints a vivid image of their captivating presence.

“That softness which beneath the surface lies” : In this line, the speech act is metaphorical. Byron describes a woman’s softness as something hidden beneath the surface. This metaphor suggests that her beauty goes beyond mere physical appearance and resides in her inner qualities. This invites the audience to perceive their depth and sensitivity.

“A mind at peace with all below.”: Here, the speech act was descriptive. Byron describes the woman’s mind as being at peace with everything below. This implies a sense of serenity, acceptance and harmony. This finding suggests that her inner calmness contributes to her overall beauty.

“One shade the more, one ray the less”: This line contains a speech act of contrast. Byron used the contrast between shade and rays to convey the delicate balance of women’s beauty. This implies that even a slight change in this balance diminishes her allure: This emphasizes the importance of maintaining an equilibrium in her appearance.

“Where thoughts serenely sweet express.” : This line involves a speech act of personification. Byron personifies thoughts as serenely sweet. This personification emphasizes the gentleness and positivity of her thoughts. This suggests that her inner world reflects her outward beauty, and adds to her captivated presence.

Through these speech acts, Lord Byron employs descriptive language, similes, metaphors, contrasts, and personification to convey the nuanced layers of women’s beauty. The poem engages with the audience's emotions, evokes vivid imagery, and invites them to explore the depths of her allure beyond its mere physical attributes. This reveals the interconnectedness of inner and outer beauty, and the delicate balance that adds to her captivating presence.

The Idea of Eloquent Communication

“She walks in beauty, like the night” : The line suggests that the woman’s beauty communicates a story, akin to the eloquent communication of the night. The night has its own languages of serenity, mystery, and silence. Comparing the woman to the night, the poem implies that her beauty carries a similar narrative through her physical presence.

“Which heaven to gaudy day denies.” : This line implies that women’s beauty communicates a distinction between heavenly and artificial. This suggests that her allure rejected ostentation and embraced a more genuine and serene expression. By contrasting heavenly beauty with the gaudiness of daylight, the poem emphasizes the eloquence of a woman’s presence in conveying a deeper meaning.

“A mind at peace with all below” : The poem suggests that the woman’s inner peace and self-possession are reflected in her outer beauty. Her serene mind communicates a narrative of contentment and harmony with the surrounding world. This implies that her beauty communicates not only through physical appearance but also through her inner state of being.

“Where thoughts serenely sweet express.” : This line suggests that the woman’s thoughts are eloquently expressed through her beauty. Her expressions, smiles, and tints convey a narrative of virtuous experiences and hearts that are untainted by impure love. This implies that her beauty communicates not only through physical features but also through the emotions and values she embodies.

By applying Austin’s theoretical lens, this study uncovered the nuanced layer of meaning in Lord Byron’s poem, highlighting the idea that women’s beauty and presence communicate meanings beyond words. Her expression, serenity, and virtuous experiences are conveyed through her physical appearance, inviting the audience to understand and appreciate the deeper narrative communicated through her beauty.

The Notion of Harmony with the World

“She walks in beauty, like the night”

A comparison of women’s beauty to night suggests a harmonious relationship with the external world. Night is often associated with calmness, serenity, and acceptance of one’s surroundings.
